





It is my pleasure and honor to welcome all players to 41st Queen Sirikit Cup to be played at Glenelg Golf Club in South Australia. The Queen Sirikit Cup is the second oldest Championship after Nomura Cup (Asia Pacific Amateur Team Championship) in the Asia Pacific Golf Confederation's (APGC) 55 years of history and it has provided a platform for many elite women players to pursue their career further.

Last year women players in the Asia Pacific region showed again, outstanding performance in the international competitions. At the World Women's Amateur Golf Championship (Espirito Santo Trophy) in Ireland, Japan, Korea and China came 2nd, 3rd and 4th after USA as a team and Ayean Cho of Korea and Yuka Yasuda of Japan came 1st and 2nd in the individual stroke game. At the Youth Olympic Games in Argentine, Grace Kim of Australia won the gold medal in the individual game while Team Thailand won the gold medal in the team (mixed) event. Earlier, in March, Team Asia Pacific's formidable victory over the European Team at the Patsy Hankins Trophy in Doha, Qatar, made us convinced of their excellence.

The Queen Sirikit Cup has significantly contributed to the prevailing strength of women golfers in the Asia Pacific. Naturally it helped the R&A and the APGC in creating the Women's Amateur Asia-Pacific (WAAP), a premier world class women's amateur championship last year.

Before concluding my message, I want to reiterate the importance of the Queen Sirikit Cup to create more value not only as a platform for the elite players but as a network to promote women's golf in all forms in the 42 member countries of the APGC.

THE QUEEN SIRIKIT CUP

HISTORY OF QUEEN SIRIKIT CUP

The first Amateur Ladies Asia-Pacific Invitational Golf Team Championship was held in Thailand in 1979 with the aim to raise the standard of Asia-Pacific Ladies golf and to prepare competitors for future participation on the world stage.

At the behest of the Founder President of the Thailand Amateur Ladies Golf Association, Mom Kobkaew Abhakara, Her Majesty Queen Sirikit of Thailand donated a beautifully hand-crafted silver cup and lent her name to this exciting competition.

Initially 12 countries were invited to send their national teams to play in the inaugural championship at Navatanee Golf Course in Bangkok in February 1979. Nine teams attended with Japan winning the first Queen Sirikit Cup and Thailand runner-up.

Through more than two decades, membership in the Queen Sirikit Cup Championship now includes 14 countries in the Asia-Pacific region, stretching from New Zealand, north to Korea, and westward to India.

Countries include: Australia, China, Chinese Taipei, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Myanmar New Zealand, Philippines, Singapore, and Thailand.

Member countries take turns to host the tournament each year.

Over the events' time of Queen Sirikit Cup competition it has done much to lift the standard of women's golf in the Asia-Pacific region and foster closer ties and understanding amongst different nations like many great sporting events.

OBJECTIVES OF THE QUEEN SIRIKIT CUP

Although the tournament itself is very competitive, its uniqueness is the friendship fostered among the participants.

This is reflected in the official objectives of the Queen Sirikit Cup:

- To promote friendship and sportsmanship among women golfers of competing countries
- To ensure and uphold the highest standard of golf for amateur women golfers on the world stage

HOW THE QUEEN SIRIKIT CUP IS PLAYED

Held on an annual basis, the Queen Sirikit Cup is decided over three 18-hole rounds of stroke play competition with the best two gross scores to count each day for the team.

There is also an individual event for the three-day combined gross scores and a daily prize for the best score.

Each country at the Queen Sirikit Cup is represented by a team of three players, along with a non-playing captain.

Two official practice days precede the championship itself and official opening and closing ceremonies celebrate the event's regional importance.

CONDITIONS OF PLAY

NAME, AFFILIATION, SLOGAN & THEME SONG

- 1.1 The name of the Championship is to be known as "The Queen Sirikit Cup Asia-Pacific Amateur Ladies Golf Team Championship" (hereinafter called "the Championship"). As from the 38th Queen Sirikit Cup in 2016, the Championship is affiliated into the Asia-Pacific Golf Confederation (APGC) as its annual ladies' team event.
- 1.2 The slogan "Where Legends Are Born", created at the 34th Championship in Singapore, was adopted as an official slogan to be used in all future Queen Sirikit Cup Championships.
- 1.3 The tournament's theme song, "The Women's Spirit", composed at the 10th Anniversary of the Championship in Thailand, is to be played at all Queen Sirikit Cup's ceremonies & functions.

2. OBJECTIVES

- 2.1 To promote friendship and sportsmanship among lady golfers of participating countries.
- 2.2 To raise the standard of golf for amateur ladies.

3. DATES

The Championship shall be held from Wednesday to Friday, on the dates to be confirmed by the host country.

4. VENUE

The Championship shall be held at the venue designated by the host country.

5. MANAGEMENT

The championship shall be managed by a Championship Committee appointed by the host country. The decision of the Championship Committee in all matters shall be final.

6. ENTRY

Invitations shall be extended to the following countries:

Australia, China, Chinese Taipei, Hong Kong-China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Myanmar, New Zealand, Philippines, Singapore, and Thailand.

New members may be admitted to join the championship, subject to approval of existing member countries.

After three consecutive years of absence, a member country shall be deemed to have withdrawn from the championship, and in the future will have to reapply for membership.



CONDITIONS OF PLAY

7. TEAMS

Each country shall be represented by a team of two or three players and a captain, all of whom shall be amateur golfers according to the Rules of Amateur Status as approved by the R&A or the United States Golf Association. The captain may either be one of the two or three players or a non-playing captain.

Each member of the team shall be a female at birth, citizen of the country she represents, or a resident who has resided there for at least one year.

8. CHAMPIONSHIP

- 8.1 All play shall be in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by the R&A and with the Local Rules approved by the Championship Committee.
- 8.2 Format of Play The Championship shall be decided by stroke play over three rounds of 18 holes each, subject to the Championship Committee's right, in the event of the conditions or circumstances which make the playing of three rounds impractical, to cancel one round. In case of cancellation of any round due to weather condition, 36 holes can be held on the same day to make up for a minimum of 36 holes to be played. In each round, the total of the two lowest gross scores returned by the players in each team shall be the team's score for that round. The total of the team's gross scores for the three rounds shall be the team's score for the Championship. The team returning the lowest gross score for the Championship shall be the winner. The teams returning the next lowest gross scores for the Championship shall be the 1st and 2nd runner-up teams.
- 8.3 Draws Starting times for the last day of the Championship shall be based on the team's standings and then the player's standings.

8.4 Decision in case of ties for the 1st place

If two or more Teams tie for the Championship, the order of finishing will be decided as follows:

- a. Firstly, by taking into account the non-counting score for the 3rd round
- b. If still tied, the non-counting score for the 2nd round
- c. If still tied, the non-counting score for the 1st round
- d. If still tied joint winners will be declared

If less than 3 rounds are completed, (a) above does not apply. If less than 2 rounds are completed, (a) and (b) above do not apply. In any of the above situations, a team returning a non-counting score will always achieve a better position than a team that does not return a non-counting score (e.g. due to disqualification, withdrawal due to illness or injury, or a team that only has two players).

CONDITIONS OF PLAY

8. CHAMPIONSHIP

In the case of ties for 2nd or 3rd place, duplicate medals will be awarded.

- 8.5 Ties for individual's first place is to be decided by way of a play-off for 1st place only.
- 8.6 Count-back procedure for subsequent placings In the event of a tie for the second or subsequent places, the result shall be decided over the scores for the last 18 holes (the best two scores nominated by the team captain, counting for the team event). If the tie is still unresolved, the result shall be decided over the last nine holes, failing which the last six holes, failing which the last three holes. If the tie's then still unresolved, the result shall be decided over the last six holes of the first nine holes of the last round, failing which the last three holes of the first nine holes. If the tie then be still unresolved the result shall be decided by counting back hole-by-hole, starting with the last hole of the last 18 holes. Decision in case of ties for other individual or Daily Prizes, if any, should follow the foregoing basis.
- 8.7 Disqualification Disqualification of a player in any round shall not disqualify the player from any other round unless the Championship Committee decides otherwise.
- 8.8 Caddie Professional golfers are prohibited from caddying for players.
- 8.9 **Practice** Unofficial practice rounds are not prohibited as long as no burden is placed on the Host Association.
- **8.10 Conforming Driver Head** The driver the competitor carries must have a clubhead, identified by model and loft, that is named on the current List of Conforming Driver Heads issued by R&A Rules Limited.
- 8.11 Substitution of Player No substitution of player can be made after the first round has begun.
- 8.12 Non-playing Team captain Each Team may appoint one person who shall be authorized to give advice to the Team. The person appointed must be an amateur under the Rules of Amateur Status and is required to register with the Championship Committee.

8.13 Slow Play & Pace of Play Guidelines

The attention of all competitors is drawn to the pace of play condition (Rule 5.6). In the interest of fair play, the Championship Committee will not hesitate to impose the penalties as provided below. The maximum time for completion of any stroke, including strokes on the putting green is:

- 50 seconds for first player to play; and
- 40 seconds for second and subsequent players



CONDITIONS OF PLAY

8. CHAMPIONSHIP

Timing procedure will apply if a group is lagging behind and is "out of position". Definition of "out of position": When a group arrives at a teeing ground and there is a clear hole ahead, except at a par 5 when all the players in the preceding group are on the putting green.

Timing will commence for each player when it is her turn to play and the way ahead is clear.

Definition of out of position

"out of position" occurs: (a) if a group, when it has reached a certain hole, has spent more than standard time (total of allocated time by the Time Par to reach to that hole), or (b) if a group(after 2nd group) is left behind more than one hole(a par-4 hole is standard) by the group ahead. When both (a) and (b) occur, the group is deemed to be "out of position".

PENALTIES: 1 bad time: official warning

: 2 bad times: 1 stroke

: 3 bad times: additional 2 strokes

: 4 bad times: disqualification

8.14 Close of Competition - The competition is deemed to have closed when Chairman of Championship Committee has declared the result at the awarding ceremony.

8.15 Suspension of Play; Resumption of Play

The following signals will be used to suspend and resume play: Immediate stop for imminent danger – one prolonged note of a siren Stop for a non-dangerous situation – three consecutive notes of a siren Resumption of play – two consecutive notes of a siren Note: When play is stopped for imminent danger, all practice areas will be immediately closed.

- 8.16 Transportation During a round, a player or caddie must not ride on any form of motorized transportation except as authorized or later approved by the Committee. A player who will play, or has played, under penalty of stroke and distance is always authorized to ride on motorized transportation. The player gets the general penalty for each hole during which there is a breach. A breach between two holes applies to the next hole.
- 8.17 **Distance Measuring Device:** DMD usage without a slope rating is allowed. Yardage book is to be made available to all players by the Organizing Committee.

CONDITIONS OF PLAY

9. PRIZES

- 9.1 Prizes shall be awarded to the teams and players in the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd teams.
- 9.2 Individual prizes shall be awarded to the three best scores.
- 9.3 There shall be a Daily Prize for the best score on each day. Additional prizes may be awarded at the discretion of the host country. In case of ties for individual prizes, they shall be decided in the same manner as ties for team placing.
- 9.4 Mementos shall be awarded to the captains and players of all participating teams.

10. THE QUEEN SIRIKIT CUP

The original Queen Sirikit Cup is to be handed over at the Opening Ceremony to the host country by the captain or the representative of the host country in the foregoing year. The winning team shall receive a replica of the Queen Sirikit Cup. The original Cup shall be kept by the Queen Sirikit Cup Secretariat in Thailand. A symbolic prize shall be given to the 2nd and 3rd teams and players as well. (The replica of the Queen Sirikit Cup may be ordered through Thailand Ladies Golf Association).

11. PRE-QUEEN SIRIKIT CUP COMPETITION

A pre-Queen Sirikit Cup Competition in any format deemed suitable by the host country shall be arranged for all team captains and guests a day before the Championship starts.

12. EXPENSES

- a. The host country shall be responsible for the following expenses:
- 1 Prizes, replica cup & memento
- 2 Caddie & practice balls
- 3 Local transportation
- 4 Scheduled functions (Welcome Cocktails or Dinner / Captains' luncheon / Pre-Queen Sirikit Cup Tournament / Farewell Dinner)
- b. Each country shall be responsible for the traveling and meal expenses of its own team, while the 4-member team's accommodation is being subsidized by the R&A.
- c. Subscription Fee Each country shall pay an annual subscription fee of US\$250 to the Queen Sirikit Cup's Secretariat Fund, to subsidize the administrative expenses of the Championship and website's maintenance. The Secretary-General shall be responsible for the Secretariat's Fund received from member countries to cover her necessary travel, administrative expenses, individual winner's subsidy and advance on the

cost of the replica. The Statement of account is to be reported at the Team Captains' Meeting yearly.

d. Host country is to contribute 5% from the remaining balance of the R&A's subsidy, if there is any, to the Secretariat's Fund.

13. MEETING OF THE CAPTAINS

A Meeting of the Team Captains of participating teams shall be held during each Championship at the place where the Championship is held. The host country shall nominate a person to chair this meeting in a non-voting capacity. In the event of an equality of votes, the Secretary-General of the Queen Sirikit Cup shall have a casting vote. Minutes of each meeting shall be kept by the Secretary-General of the Queen Sirikit Cup Championship, or in her absence, by some other person appointed by the meeting.

14. AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the Rules and Conditions may be made at the Team Captains' Meeting on a majority vote basis. The Secretary-General of the Queen Sirikit Cup Championship shall have a casting vote, if necessary.

15. THE SECRETARIAT

The Secretariat is managed by the Secretary-General of the Queen Sirikit Cup Championship, who shall be responsible for maintaining all records, correspondence and website, drawing up a Guideline handbook for the organizing country to follow, sending out the Agenda, updating the membership's mailing addresses, keeping the Minutes of the Team Captains' meeting, maintaining the Secretariat's Fund and coordinating with the Royal Palace on related matters.

The Asia-Pacific Amateur Ladies Golf Team Championship for the Queen Sirikit Cup was launched in 1979 as an invitational event by Thailand Ladies Golf Association at Navatanee Golf Course, where the World Cup was played earlier in 1975. Her Majesty Queen Sirikit graciously consented to have the challenge Trophy in her name for the champion team.

The main objectives of the Queen Sirikit Cup are to raise the standard of ladies' golf in the region and to promote goodwill and lasting friendships among the participants.

The original invitations were sent to 14 countries and a total of 9 countries took part. They included Japan, Korea, Hong Kong, India, Sri Lanka, Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia and Thailand. Japan team was the first winner of the Queen Sirikit Cup.

The member countries took turn to play host in the following years and more countries were admitted in as members. They included Australia, Philippines and New Zealand in the first decade, whereby Australia and Japan won most tournaments. At the 10th anniversary held in Thailand, the tournament's theme song, The Women's Spirit, was composed and used at every Queen Sirikit Cup since then.

- China and Chinese Taipei joined the Queen Sirikit Cup in the second decade, but Sri Lanka had to pull out due to the lack of competitive players.
- At the 26th edition of the Championship played in China, The R&A's Golf Development Committee came forward to offer financial support to the Queen Sirikit Cup to cover the Teams' accommodation. This kind contribution has continued annually ever since.
- In the 3rd decade at the 34th Queen Sirikit Cup hosted by Singapore, a tournament slogan was adopted for the Championship to be known as "Where Legends Are Born". It was timely since many former team players have become very successful and well-known in professional golf field.



- At the 37th Queen Sirikit Cup in Hong Kong, the Championship was invited to become affiliated to the Asia-Pacific Golf Confederation and included in the Confederation's annual fixtures for women's golf. Myanmar was also admitted in as the 14th member of the Queen Sirikit Cup that year.
- Since then, the APGC has launched a new ladies' team match between Europe and Asia-Pacific in 2016 to compete for the Patsy Hankins Trophy. Twelve top players from the Queen Sirikit Cup member countries formed the Asia-Pacific women's team and won the inaugural match against Europe in Portugal that year. The APGC's team also won the 2nd Patsy Hankins Trophy in Doha in 2018.
- Also in February 2018, the APGC inaugurated a new Women's Amateur Asia-Pacific Championship in cooperation with The R&A and The Masters, to provide a platform for the top-ranking amateurs to hone their skills in the ultimate pursuit of a professional career. The gold medal for the winner was named after Rae-Vadee T. Suwan, The Queen Sirikit Cup's Secretary-General, in recognition for her long involvement in ladies' golf development in the region.
- The 40th Queen Sirikit Cup Championship was co-hosted in Thailand by Thailand Golf Association and Thailand Ladies Golf Association during May 9-11, 2018 at Thana City Country Club, with full 14-members participation. Past Team Captains and officials who were involved with the earlier events were invited to join the 40th anniversary The tournament turned out to be celebration. one of the most competitive championships ever witnessed in its long history. In the opening round, defending champion Korea led the field with one stroke at 138, followed by Japan and China at 139. In the second round, Philippines came forward to take the lead with 277, followed by Japan at 278 with Korea and host Thailand tying in 3rd spot at 279.

The final round was full of excitement as all players in the leading teams were playing their best and it was a very competitive game with only one stroke between them. At the end of the round, Korea and Thailand teams finished tied in first place at 417 (-15), followed by Japan at 418. The countback procedure on the 3rd player was adopted to decide the winner. Korea's third player, Heejeong Lim returned a 72 to win over Thailand's N. Vongtaveelap who shot 73. So Team Korea successfully defended her title.

In the individual category, Atthaya Thitikul of Thailand produced the commendable scores of 71-65-67 (203) to win the first place, while Yuna Nishimura of Japan finished second with her 67-69-70 (206) and Yuka Saso of Philippines returned 69-66-72 (207) to be in third place.

At the end of the 4th decade of the Queen Sirikit Cup, the most successful team, Korea, has won 20 titles out of the 40 championships held.

The updated statistics of all the winners in the past 40 years are:

- Chinese Taipei won twice, New Zealand x 3, Japan x 6, Australia x 9 and Korea x 20.

However, regardless of whichever team will become more successful in the coming decade, the Queen Sirikit Cup Championship will continue to be the most promising stage-Where Legends Are Born.



HISTORY & LAYOUT



Glenelg Golf Club opened in 1927, and is a private golf club located in the Adelaide suburb of Novar Gardens and only 5 minutes from the seaside suburb of Glenelg. It is located adjacent the southern boundary of Adelaide International Airport and within easy access of the Adelaide CBD.

The golf course was ranked 30th by Golf Australia Magazine in the Top 100 Australian Golf Course rankings released in January 2018 and 35th by Golf Digest Magazine in March this year.

The 18-hole golf course has gently undulating couch grass fairways, bent grass greens and revetted-edge style bunkering providing its own unique characteristics reminiscent of the traditional Scottish links courses. Pine Hill, one of the highest points on the Adelaide Plains, is the dominant feature of the course with holes 8 to 13 weaving through tall, established pine trees which also dominate the course layout.

In 1998, the Club engaged golf course architects, Neil Crafter and Bob Tuohy, to rejuvenate the golf course

by returning it to its original links characteristics, converting greens to Bent grass, and conserving and re-establishing native indigenous plants, grasses and trees. The tall pine trees, which line many of the undulating, couch fairways have been retained and remain a defining feature of the course. The tall pine trees, which line many of the undulating, couch fairways have been retained and remain a defining feature of the course.

Glenelg Golf Club has hosted numerous major Australian professional and amateur events, including the South Australian Open, the South Australian PGA Championships and as well as various state and national amateur events, including the 1986 Australian Amateur Championship, the 1998 Australian Ladies Amateur Championship and the 2000 Men's Interstate Teams Matches. Just last year, Glenelg hosted the Australian Women's Interstate Teams Matches, Australia's pinnacle amateur team competition. In 2018 Glenelg hosted the first Blitz Golf in Australia, a fast paced one day Professional and Amateur tournament. In January this year Blitz Golf was back at Glenelg and is gaining traction quickly as players and fans jump on board to support.







HOLE BY HOLE LAYOUT



1ST HOLE | 301mtr | 329yd | PAR 4

A short par 4, with a slight dogleg to the left with the green visible from the tee. An iron from the tee to the more generous landing area leaves a short to mid iron to a slightly elevated green protected by two pot bunkers on the right. The more courageous will have to thread their driver between mounds and grasses on the left, and water on the right to leave themselves a short pitch to the green. This hole is best played from the left half of the fairway.



2ND HOLE | 418mtr | 457yd | PAR 5

The 2nd hole is the feature hole. The large sand dune defining the left side of the hole remains exposed, with tufty grasses and pine tree character creating a fearsome hazard. At the outside of the dog-leg, a pot bunker is in range for the longer hitter who fails to shape the drive from right to left. A small bunker sited short left of the green and the right greenside bunker define the approach to this subtle green. The bunkering style used, with its sod revetted faces, is a feature of the course.



3RD HOLE | 145mtr | 159yd | PAR 3

The 3rd hole plays to a green sited on a plateau. The siting brings the interesting linear complex of pine covered sand ridges located between the 2nd and 3rd holes as a hazard along the right side of the long par 3. The green is large and undulating but has been kept open at the left half to allow a running approach access to the green. This long par 3 is part of the demanding starting holes.



HOLE BY HOLE LAYOUT



4TH HOLE | 315mtr | 344yd | PAR 4

The 4th is a challenging hole with an open character, attractive and strategic bunkering designed for clear decision making and execution. A small bunker has been placed in the fairway, some 20-25 metres short of the fairway bunker on the left side. This calls for precision in the layup shot, but as the fairway to the left widens out there are plenty of options short of, over or around this bunker. The green complex is bunkered on both sides with a deep pot bunker front right.



5TH HOLE | 490mtr | 536yd | PAR 5

The 5th hole has a wetland sited right of the fairway around an island of original native vegetation. Bunkering on the left catches a shot that leaks off the line of play, and a group of cross bunkers just short of the green requires careful placement for the layup. The green is receptive to a well played approach, but its undulations place a premium on positioning and putting. The green is guarded by two pot bunkers set into the ridge at the left and by a large bunker front right.



6TH HOLE | 431mtr | 471yd | PAR 5

This dogleg left par 4 generally plays into a prevailing south westerly off the tee. When downwind, the corner can be taken on however a cluster of small bunkers awaits through the dogleg, as well as a notorious hidden pot bunker on the left of the fairway. Reaching the green from these bunkers is usually out of the question. If fairway is found, an accurate mid to long iron is required to the slightly elevated, long narrow green heavily bunkered on both sides. The green is quite subtle but can become very fast downhill on the front half of the green.

HOLE BY HOLE LAYOUT



7TH HOLE | 369mtr | 404yd | PAR 4

This Par 4 can vary enormously in its playing length depending on the wind direction. The prevailing south westerly will see drives having to negotiate fairway bunkering left and right to allow a mid to short iron downwind to the green. Into a northerly, a well struck drive to the left half of the fairway will be required to get a full view of the green and the long iron shot ahead. The green has enormous drama to the sides and rear in the form of mounds and grasses that form an amphitheatre around the green. Two small pot bunkers guard the approach to the green, but once on the surface, putting should not be overly complicated on a relatively flat surface.



8TH HOLE | 302mtr | 330yd | PAR 4

The 8th hole has dramatic bunkering, rolling undulations, pine trees, and water. Water and sand hills have to be negotiated by the drive, with the safer left line leaving two more shots to the green. The longer drive has to avoid a bunker left of the fairway, as well as the wetland waiting for a drive not shaped from left to right. The elevated green has a sprawling bunker left, and hollows and mounds to the right making chipping a challenge. The green is large and receptive to shots from the right half of the fairway.



9TH HOLE | 366mtr | 400yd | PAR 4

The 9th hole is a strong completion to an imposing front nine. A small pot bunker needs to be negotiated by the longer hitters seeking the preferred line of approach into the green. The green is long and narrow with a significant ridge extending into the green from the right greenside bunker. This bunker impacts on the line of approach into the green encouraging the preferred approach from the left half of the fairway. Left of the green, a distinct grassy hollow captures shots that roll down from the left bank and to provide a particular degree of difficulty for recovery shots.



HOLE BY HOLE LAYOUT



10TH HOLE | 366mtr | 400yd | PAR 4

The 10th hole has an imposing tee shot through cathedral like pines to the elevated fairway. Great importance is placed on the length and accuracy of the tee shot, as the crest of the hill needs to be reached to gain a view of the green set below. A cavernous bunker on the right side of the fairway awaits the longer hitter who fails to work the ball to the left. The green has three levels placing an emphasis on precision with the iron shot to the green. Once on the correct level, the golfer is rewarded with relatively flat putts. The green is well bunkered left, right, and long. The bunkers provide a stunning frame for the green, as do the native grasses and pines.



11TH HOLE | 147mtr | 161yd | PAR 3

The 11th hole has long been recognised as one of the most challenging par 3's on the course. The large bunker right of the green has two distinct sections, with the more heavily used first section somewhat shallower than the back section, making recovery for most a little less daunting. The putting surface has a strong fall from back to front, but the front left corner of the green is slightly raised to retain more tee shots and recovery shots from the right hand bunker. Miss the green left, and a par is difficult to achieve as two deep hollows require a delicate chip to get close to the hole.



12TH HOLE | 459mtr | 502yd | PAR 5

The 12th tee is the highest point on the course. Vistas can be enjoyed to the coast, city, Mt Lofty Ranges, as well as more immediate views over the course. The drive is best placed in the right half of the fairway to gain a view of the green but must avoid two bunkers through the fairway that eliminate any thought of reaching the green in two. The green is situated in a dell and has a distinct slope away from the approach shot. A ridge runs along the left side of the green, with a small grassy knob sticking into the right side of the green. A green then tests even the best putters.

HOLE BY HOLE LAYOUT



13TH HOLE | 347mtr | 379yd | PAR 4

The 13th hole, originally redesigned in 1999, was completed in 2004 with the creation of the new tee complex. A new green was constructed in a totally new location and is set at the base of the course's major sand dune, Pine Hill. Once at the dogleg, the golfer is faced with a mid to short iron, usually back into the prevailing breeze, to a green protected by water on the left and small bunkers to the right and rear of the green. The putting surface is not overly large, but two putts from above the hole can prove tricky when the greens are quick.



14TH HOLE | 152mtr | 166yd | PAR 3

The 14th hole is generally a mid iron to a green well protected by 6 bunkers right and left, and a steep drop at the rear of the green. Often played down breeze, the tee shot needs to be well struck to hold the gently undulating green, as the steep drop over the back makes recovery very difficult. A running approach shaped from left to right is possible but made difficult by an approach bunker some 20 metres short of the green, which also makes club selection from the tee deceiving. This hole is beautifully framed by native vegetation and water.



15TH HOLE | 369mtr | 404yd | PAR 4

The drive on the 15th must negotiate a number of bunkers, protecting not only the long drive, but also making players think very carefully about where they lay up. Two deep traps protecting the left side of the fairway can be trouble. Similarly, if you try to take on the slight dogleg and bunker carry, sand and water could come into play. Once the tee shot has been negotiated, a small undulating green is the next target, set on a plateau with deep rough either side. The green has subtle and obvious undulations.

HOLE BY HOLE LAYOUT



16TH HOLE | 137mtr | 150yd | PAR 3

Set high above a massive expanse of wetlands, the 16th tee offers an excellent view of the green, situated amongst the wetlands, with water short, right and long. The green setting is nothing short of spectacular, with the wetlands framing the front, right and back of the green, and an area recently re-vegetated with native plants framing the left hand side.



17TH HOLE | 365mtr | 399yd | PAR 4

The 17th hole contributes to the overall strength of the finishing holes. At the inside corner of the dog-leg, an existing hollow has been converted into a fearsome pot bunker with a sandy waste area located beyond. Longer hitters wishing to cut the dog-leg must carry this bunker at a considerable risk, as it is virtually impossible to reach the green with a recovery shot. Although a wide green, the strong front left bunker guards the shallower left portion, whilst the deeper, right portion is trapped at the right rear. Grassy hollows back and left make recovery difficult for shots slightly off target.



18TH HOLE | 494mtr | 540yd | PAR 5

With the clubhouse visible in the distance, the 18th hole swings left to a green setting that invites a great finish to a round. The tee shot must find fairway between water and sand, whilst the shorter shot is afforded a more generous landing area. But it is the second half of the hole where most decisions must be made. From a long drive, the green is reachable in two, but cross bunkers must be negotiated by shaping the ball left to right or by carrying them. The green is protected by bunkers to the right and front left, and the lake along the left side. The green itself is large and some significant contouring can test one's putting skill at the end of the round.


